The semantic theory of the De interpretatione places itself at the service of Aristotle's study of contradiction between assertions, and reflects a Platonic debate on the question how beliefs and assertions come to be true or false. It is from this perspective, and not for their own sake, that the theory also addresses itself to the minimum semantic components of assertions, names and verbs.

We argue that Aristotle's concept of the linguistic sign is based on three different relations which together evince his teleological as well empiricist point of view: one internal (symbolic) relation and two external relations, i.e. a likeness relation and a relation *katà synthéken*.

Aristotle holds that ethos is the most important of these elements, since trust in the speaker is required if one is to believe the speech. However, the best speech balances ethos, pathos, and logos. In rhetoric, enthymemes play a deductive role, while examples play an inductive role (Rhet. 1356b11-18).
